# SUNDAY AUGUST 27: ANNUAL PICNIC AND MEMBERS' PLANT SALE

Note change of DATE and PLACE! We are meeting on Sunday August 27 (the 4<sup>th</sup> week-end of August) at the picnic shelter at Upper Treman State Park.

Please think about potting up plants now for our annual member sale August 27th. Here's your opportunity to share some of your select plants (even if you can only spare one division) where you can be sure they'll be nurtured and appreciated. Please label them in advance as this will facilitate set-up.

Plans are set for this year's members plant sale to be held at the picnic shelter at Treman State Park's Upper Entrance. Note at 10 a.m. the Park starts charging a parking fee (unless you have a season pass). For directions go to the Park website **Robert H. Treman State Park** and click on directions, which will take you to Google maps. The Park's address is 105 Enfield Center Road, Ithaca, however you will drive past the main entrance and proceed up a long and winding hill to the upper entrance.

- 10:00 a.m. Arrive, get your plant sale number and help with sale set-up; bring a dish-to-pass
- 11:00 a.m. (approximately) Plant sale begins
- 12:00 noon Lunch and optional cook-out
- Hike the gorge (optional)

As in past years, we'll very democratically allow those who arrive first to get "first dibs" at purchases. So it pays to arrive early and sign in. All members are welcome, whether you

bring plants to sell or not. This sale has become an important revenue stream for the Chapter and a great source for adding exciting new plants to your garden.

For the treasured and rare plants, we will have a silent auction table. Note this is our only members-only sale and we should have some real gems (last year there were a number of rock garden plants and they were a big hit). You may join for 2017 at the meeting for \$10 (\$15 for families). It's still a great value since we have half of our program year ahead of us.

The sale begins at approximately 11, with a dish-to-pass lunch to follow. Please bring your own service. Beverages will be supplied. We'll fire up the grill for those who want to bring grillables.

We have a great set-up for the sale with options to contend with whatever weather mother nature throws at us - indoor tables, outdoor tables under a roofed porch, and exposed outdoor tables.

Following lunch, those who wish to hike the gorgeous gorge at Treman may do so. It's a short but steep downhill hike with wet spots on the trail so wear good shoes and of course, the return is all uphill. If you've never done this before, it comes highly recommended. Hopefully we won't be flooded out as happened the last time we held our sale at this park.

All in all, look forward to a good time with plenty of plants and food for everyone!

We only saw *Saxifraga oppositifolia* (purple saxifrage) in one location in Montana, near the Wyoming border, growing on a cliff, but I am happy that it seems to grow reasonably well here in central New York. This tour was offered by NARGS as one of its member benefits.

Behind the scenes, your board has been working on the speakers for our fall 2017 meetings and Plant-of-the-Month for September and October. We have some very worthwhile speakers lined up to lure you inside from the blissfull fall weather we are all hoping to see.



# MORE NEWS FROM NARGS: ANNUAL MEETING & CONFERENCE NOVEMBER 17-19 IN DURHAM, NC

If you haven't been to a NARGS annual meeting, here's a great opportunity to attend one since it is driving distance away. In November, "up north," we are retiring our gardens and anticipating the winter ahead but the weather in North Caroline is still mild and viewing gardens there should be a most welcome sight.



The 2017 Annual General Meeting (AGM) of NARGS will be held in Durham, North Carolina on November 17-19, and is being hosted by the Piedmont Chapter. The AGM will explore the past, present, and future of rock gardening in the southeastern and mid-Atlantic regions of the U.S.

The AGM will include a welcome reception and presentation on Friday evening, November 17; a full day of presentations on Saturday, November 18; and tours to three gardens in the Triangle area

on Sunday, November 19. Additional activities include an optional pre-conference, two-day guided tour of botanically interesting natural areas in North Carolina's Coastal Plain on November 15 and 16, and visits to several gardens in the Triangle area on November 17. Details on the meeting as well as an on-line registration form are available on the meeting website (www.piedmontnargs.org).

The meeting is being held in November to see the amazing drifts of fall-blooming snowdrops (Galanthus elwesii var. monostictus) and other bulbs at Nancy Goodwin's garden at Montrose; to see Tony Avent's Juniper Level Botanic Garden (and its recently installed crevice garden) and to shop at Plant Delights Nursery; and to see the plants and gardens at the JC Raulston Arboretum. It will be an opportunity to learn about and see other outstanding gardens. The Triangle Area (Raleigh-Durham-Chapel Hill), North Carolina, has a rich history of outstanding gardeners, including Tony Avent, Nancy Goodwin, Elizabeth Lawrence, William Lanier Hunt, and J. C. Raulston.



The conference includes outstanding speakers (Tim Alderton, Tony Avent , John Grimshaw, Larry Mellichamp, Jeremy Schmidt, Andrea Sprott, Joseph Tychonievich, and

Bobby Ward) as well as visits to some of the area's best gardens. In designing the meeting, we have minimized the hassle and expense associated with renting a car or hiring a taxi. The host hotel - the Sheraton Imperial near the Raleigh-Durham (RDU) airport -- will provide free shuttle service between the airport and the hotel. In addition, transportation will be provided for the garden tours.
