I'm trying some new plants in the rock garden, which is fun, and they seem to be surviving the summer heat (lots of watering helps). June/July is not the best time to plant, but it seems to be working here. I'm bringing some of the remaining seedlings to the picnic and hope others can enjoy them as well!

Trough Workshop Report

The spring rains took a break on Saturday June 8 for the Chapter's trough-making workshop. A small but adventurous group under the tutelage of Bill Stark built troughs using the "bonding cement and hypertufa over styrofoam box" method.

At first the process was slow-going as the preparations are labor intensive - at least in comparison to building the more conventional hypertufa trough with mix and mold. Bill, our vigilant workshop leader, assured us not only will our new trough be lightweight (at least unplanted), it will also outlive the conventional trough because of its increased strength.

After a lunch break the fun really began - while we played with mud i.e. the surface bonding material that resembled brownie dough consistency but not in color - to cover our prepared boxes. Lastly, we applied a thin finishing layer of traditional hypertufa mix. While our creations were setting a bit, we enjoyed a toast to our day's accomplishments.

We each hauled off our new planter, carefully wrapped in plastic to begin the curing process. Thank you Bill and Mary for hosting us and teaching us this technique. The beautiful day at lakeside and garden tour were additional treats. All in all it was a very satisfying and rewarding day.

Extreme Rock Gardening

We're rebuilding our driveway and found a 20' long 70,000 lb rock in our way. Our contractor suggested jack hammering the rock into gravel, but I decided it would look great in our garden. We couldn't move the entire rock, but we thought that we could move half if we could get rollers underneath it. Luckily, there was a natural fault halfway down the rock. I spent 3 days on my knees cleaning out the fault so that I could slide a flat discharge hose (red in the photo) into the crack. Pressurizing the hose to 90 psi generated nearly 100,000 lb of force and split the rock. I jammed spacers into the crack while the hose was inflated, then deflated the hose and inserted wood strips under the hose so that the next time the hose was inflated, the crack would open wider. The hose only exploded once - 90 psi was well beyond its pressure rating. Slowly, about 3/4" per step, the crack widened until I could slide a hydraulic jack into the crack and then fit rollers under the rock. The rock is now 75% of the way to its new home.

Our September 21 meeting (1:00 PM, Whetzel Hall, Cornell Plant Science Bldg.) will feature Cate Crawford, whose family operates Lyndaker Farms in Salisbury Center New York (Herkimer County, Zone 4a)

Cate will share cultivation information and lessons her family has learned developing stunning peony forms at Lyndaker Farms, where they raise hardy Herbaceous, Itoh, and Tree Peonies for mail order. Lyndaker's specializes in Itoh peonies, which are a cross between an herbaceous peony and a tree peony. Although they are challenging to hybridize, Itohs result in some of the finest flowers, with strong woody stems, in a broad range of colors. Cate will offer recommendations on site selection, soil amendments and plant maintenance that apply to rock garden, fernleaf, intersectional and tree peonies.

Packed into 3 days will be daytime field trips to private gardens and Cornell Botanic Gardens, optional "night owl" mini-talks, plant sales by choice vendors, door prizes, book signings, and an optional pre-conference tour to visit three exceptional private gardens in the Syracuse area.* We are especially excited to be able to bring two international speakers - Kaj Andersen and Harry Jans. And of course we've planned naturalist-led hikes to showcase the beauty of our gorges and waterfalls and the flora to be found there. Our logo designed by Cornell graduate Patty Chan features a little native fern found in our gorges, *Asplenium trichomanes*, Maidenhair Spleenwort.

Cornell's north campus and Robert Purcell Community Center will be "Conference Central." We are expecting over 100 people to attend from all over the U.S. and perhaps a few international attendees too. We hope a good number of our Chapter members will also attend. Registration is set at \$425 and includes all meals (with the exception of Saturday dinner), beginning with dinner Thursday through breakfast Sunday. To defray the cost to our members our Chapter is offering \$300 stipends to anyone who has not previously received a stipend to attend a national NARGS meeting. (A previous Green Dragon announced this news. More information will be forthcoming at our fall meetings and through fall newsletters)

We also hope our members will join in the fun by volunteering to help during the conference – whether you are registered or not. We've identified a number of opportunities from serving as bus monitor, to helping vendors with plant sales, to greeting and orienting out-of-town registrants, and the list goes on. Most of the volunteer needs require a minimal amount of time ranging from 2-8 hours. You will be hearing more about the needs we've identified as the months progress.

June 2020 might seem a long way off but for five of our members comprising the Planning Committee – John Gilrein, Terry Humphries, Marlene Kobre, Steve Whitesell, and Carol Eichler, these dates have been on their minds for some months already. We're off to a good start. So mark your calendar, save the date, and plan to attend.
