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May 20 - Member Plant Sale

Spring is in the air (or did we just skip directly to summer?). May is one of the gardener's busiest months – transplanting, weeding, mulching, etc. but the most fun of all at this time of year is buying new plants. ACNARGS is happy to feed your buying frenzy with our annual May plant sale.

This year our sale is for members only on Saturday, May 20 at the same large pavilion at Myers Park, near the marina. (snow blizzard or flooding notwithstanding) that we've used the last few years. Note: Unless you are a resident of the Town of Lansing, the park charges admission of \$7 per car. Bring plants or not; be prepared to buy; bring a friend. (optional);

As in past years we can expect a broad selection of plants, not just those for the rock garden. The sale also becomes a learning experience since every year it seems rare or unusual plants are brought in (and at least for me, some I am unfamiliar with). As a well-known gardener once said,

Volunteers: Thank you to those who answered the call for helping with set-up, cashiering, and clean-up. I could still use a few more people to assist either with set-up beginning at 9 or clean-up.

Lunch: We want to resume our traditional dish-to-pass lunch. This will be the first since Covid. Out of an abundance of caution we temporarily replaced the potluck with BYO bag lunch. The chapter will provide beverages. Remember to bring your own table setting!

Here's the schedule for May 20th

- 9:00 a.m. Set-up begins at Pavilion B at Myers Park, Lansing
- 10:00 a.m. Plan to arrive if you are bringing plants
- 10:30 a.m. Sale begins no earlier than 10:30 (or a bit later if need be)
- 12:00 p.m. Sale concludes, cashier opens to take your payment, and clean-up begins (with lots of helpers this will go fast); if we finish earlier, we eat earlier!
- 12:30 Dish-to-Pass, relax, socialize.

Advanced Logistics: Now is the time, if you haven't already started, to pot up plants for the sale. To minimize the spread of jumping worms, remember to bare-root each plant before potting it into a soil-less potting mix. (If you do not have jumping worms in your garden, we also suggest bare rooting any plant purchases before setting them out in your garden.

Label your plants in advance please. Consider what plants you should bring and focus on plants that are not so common, Think small quantities! If you are not able to attend, please consider donating plants anyway and asking a fellow member to bring them.

Day of Sale Logistics: As you arrive, we ask that you place the plants that you bring on the appropriate tables, which will have signage so plants will be in roughly alphabetical order. Our sale procedure will be essentially the same as previous years (please refer to May 2022 Green Dragon at acnargs.org newsletter archives).

Auction Table: Special plants should be placed on the bid table.

Directions to Myers Park and the Pavilion Take 34B (whether approaching from the north or south). Before the bridge over Salmon Creek, turn onto Myers Road, towards the lake. If you miss the turn, this road forms a loop so it intersects 34B again after you cross the bridge. The entrance to Myers Park is ahead at the stop sign on Myers Road. You will cross the railroad tracks. Pavilion B is located near the marina with ample parking available.

My seed starting is going well this year. I sowed seeds from the seed exchange in February, and the pots have been outdoors now for over 2 months, except for the Drabas, which don't need stratification. I don't expect everything to germinate, so I'm pretty



happy now with a dozen or so pots with germination, and expecting more germination when the weather is more consistently warm. I'm hoping to keep these new plants going until the August plant sale; maybe some of the drabas

will be big enough to bring in May. It's hard to know why some of the seeds don't germinate. My theory is that it was a combination of me tending to plant too deeply (until this year), and the viability of some



seeds being poor. Well, if they ALL germinated, would I have time to deal with hundreds of seedlings?

We are planning a field trip to see plants in the wild to Labrador Pond (between Truxton and Fabius) and Clark Reservation (Jamesville). I've done a little research on what to expect in the way of interesting plants at Labrador Pond (two are pinxter azaleas and Labrador tea, both rhododendrons); I'm more familiar with Clark Reservation, known for its rare ferns, hart's tongue (Asplenium scolopendrium) and walking fern (Asplenium rhizophyllum). We're still working on a date, I'm thinking May would be best. If you were NOT at the April 15 meeting and are interested in this trip, please email me, and you'll be included in the email announcements.

There is no planned garden tour event for 2023; so far no volunteer for this. However, if you would like to see some gardens, there are other options. Check the Garden Conservancy's website and you can find both local and farther afield gardens with their open dates. Contact another chapter member or two and find out if you can visit the person's garden. Most of us who toil in our gardens like to share them with like-minded visitors! The email addresses of our members are in the Member Directory, along with an indication if the person has an open garden (willing to receive visitors, assuming the date is planned). Don't have the directory? Email me for a copy.

Hope you have bountiful blooms and see you in May!

In other words, the forum serves as just another way to connect with other gardeners between Chapter meetings.
