As in the past, Craig Cramer is coordinating the AV details. Here is what Craig writes: "My goal is to make it easy for anyone who has great images to share to do so easily. Here are the Audio/Visual (AV) formats you can use for your presentation:

- Preferred: Insert your images into a PowerPoint presentation.
- If you can't do that (I can help you if you have questions), put the images you want to use in a Folder/directory so that they are easily sorted by file name in the order that you want to show them. For example, you could rename your files O1rock-garden-spring.jpg, O2rock-garden-summer.jpg, O3rock-garden-fall.jpg, etc.

You can send the PowerPoint or Folder to me via email and I can check them out beforehand. (If they are too big to send as an attachment, I can set up other ways for you to get them to me


from your computer.) Or bring your PowerPoint or Folder full of images to the meeting on a USB ("flash") drive. Arrive early so we can transfer to the computer in Whetzel Room. Questions? Email: cdcramer@gmail.com. "

### 2024 SEED EXCHANGE

Our Chapter took on the enormous task of processing the 1st round of the NARGS seed exchange. It was (or still is at this writing) an enormous task, one that landed mostly on our fearless leader's shoulders. Don't get me wrong, many members came and helped to fill the orders. But John Gilrein handled all the background task, from receiving the many boxes of seed and supplies, to interacting with Joyce Fingerut and Laura Serowicz for instructions, to printing out the hundreds of orders, to hauling all those boxes to Ithaca, to handling the special orders from abroad that needed phytosanitary inspection, to being there for every session filling orders. A GREAT BIG THANK YOU, JOHN! And a special thank you to John's wife, Deb, who helped tirelessly, although plants aren't her thing! (she was just trying to stop her sweetheart from going crazy)

The first session was at the Ithaca Library. But we quickly realized that we really needed a location where we could leave everything set up for as long as needed. Setting up, taking down, and moving everything back and forth in our cars was going to take way too much time. Luckily, our chapter member Daniel Lipari has a heated basement workshop he could let us use. Thanks to all the chapter members who braved the bitter cold first few days and the long drive to Mecklenburg to work on filling orders.

The seed picking is hard on the back and requires intense concentration. We all agreed that one thing that made this hard, particularly as more of the ordered seeds were no longer available, was people who did not pick 2<sup>nd</sup> choices, yet wanted substitutes. Our instructions were that everybody needed to get a full complement of 25 (or 35) seed packets, unless they selected "no substitutes". That left us pickers to try to guess what a good substitute might be, or just hand out random seeds regardless of the recipient's location or interests. We feel that the instructions for the seed exchange should state clearly that substitutes can only be given if there are plenty of 2<sup>nd</sup> choices selected by the recipients. No (or not enough) 2<sup>nd</sup> choices means fewer seed packets in that order, especially for those members submit their orders who later.
